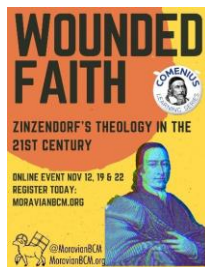
- What is Christmas Eve like for you?

A Wounded Faith: Zinzendorf's Theology in the 21st Century



We know Zinzendorf was radical in his day. His ideas on theology, the church, and missions did not sit well with many of his contemporaries but those ideas sparked communities around the world to embrace an innovative approach to faith. This year's Comenius Learning Series event focuses on Nicholas Ludwig von Zinzendorf and his radical, yet revolutionary views.

Can Zinzendorf's understanding of faith still empower communities today? Which of his ideas still resonate today? And how might Zinzendorf been more ahead of his time than he could have even known? The Rev. Chaz Snider, Associate Pastor at Calvary Moravian Church, will lead the discussion.

WACHOVIA HISTORICAL SOCIETY SUPPORT FOR RECORDS CHEROKEE. WHS President I. B. Southerland recently presented Archivist J. Eric Elliott with a \$1000 check for the Archives Book Fund, to be used to support the publication of the Records of the Moravians Among the Cherokees book series. This is the third \$1000 gift to the Archives by Wachovia Historical Society, part of a pledged \$5000 in support of the Cherokee book series. Volume 10 is expected back from the press this month.

PEC News for November

The PEC met via video conference Oct. 8 and 22 with all members participating. Each meeting began with sharing news and concerns from across the Province and prayer.

SYNOD / STRATEGIC DIRECTION

PEC received a report from the Synod Planning Committee, now meeting monthly, which included updates on: the selection of Synod co-chairs; finalizing a location for Synod; consideration of the length and schedule of Synod, and review of the Synod planning calendar.

CHURCHES AND LEADERS

PEC agreed that, until COVID-19 pandemic trends improve, meetings with church boards for call processes will be via Zoom, rather than in person. PEC made decisions and took appropriate steps in call processes for: Ardmore; Bethania; Fairview; First, Greensboro; Hope; Little Church on the Lane; Rural Hall; and Unity. PEC approved Dana Myers (Home) as a candidate for ordination upon recommendation of the Commission on Ministry – bringing the total of approved candidates to eight; had an initial interview with one person seeking candidacy; discussed three pastors from other denominations who are open to service in our Province; and received an update from an interprovincial task force on Provincial Acolytes/Lay Pastors. PEC confirmed plans for a service of ordination for Illovis Gonzalez, in Miami, Nov. 29; and approved changes in the questions in the annual reports from pastors and church educators.

BOARDS, COMMITTEES AND COMMISSIONS

PEC received a report from the Provincial Support Services board including: their work on changes and enhancements in our insurance plans and providers; and the approval of the 2019 audit of Provincial finances. PEC made arrangements for an Oct. 27 meeting with the Board of Cooperative Ministries to discuss PEC plans and priorities for the Board in 2021-22, Board organization and staffing needs.

INTERPROVINCIAL, UNITY and ECUMENICAL

PEC approved new catechism materials prepared over the past two years by the Interprovincial Faith and Order Commission; approved an orderly exchange of ministers document for our full communion relationship with the United Methodist Church; and received a report from the Oct. 7-8 Annual Forum (online) of Christian Churches Together in the USA. PEC discussed agenda items for the annual (Nov. 11-12, online) joint meeting of the Southern and Northern Province PECs; and reviewed information from the NC Synod of the ELCA about their funding and extending a call for a part-time, associate pastor for the ministry of the Dwelling. PEC agreed that Judy Knopf should attend the ELCA Church Council (national governing body) meetings which will partially conflict with the joint meeting of the PECs.

OTHER MATTERS

PEC reviewed a schedule of its 2021 meetings, noting that some adjustments will be needed; discussed a draft revised job description for a part-time Human Resources Manager position; discussed plans for a “virtual” Provincial Stewardship event to be held sometime in November; and considered advice we will need to give to pastors and church boards about how to report 2020 congregational statistics, particularly worship attendance, due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The PEC meets with the Northern Province PEC Nov. 11-12, will have a brief meeting Nov. 12, and a regular meeting Nov. 19.
