How Do You See?

“It’s not enough to reach people with better ideas or thoughts. They need a new way of thinking and seeing because in their current way they are not capable of understanding the new thoughts and ideas they really need.” When someone recently said this to me, I immediately remembered the mix and frustration that comes with learning or teaching any new thing. We mostly understand anything new we experience based on things we already assume or know. To truly grow and develop, we need to expand how we see and understand.

A few weeks ago, the PEC held a leadership summit for the clergy, provincial acolytes, and educators who serve in the MCSP as well as those eligible for call. It began with a dinner at New Philadelphia Moravian Church which featured a presentation on “TRUST” and the introduction of the members of the PEC.

We convened the next day for an 8-hour workshop of presentations, discussions, and feedback on the topics of “transparency,” “relationships,” “understanding,” “shared vision,” and “taking risks together” as the steps for building mutual trust in our ministries.

For me, the highlight was listening to discussions and responses from a wide range of ministry leaders about aspects of ministry including making space for discussion in groups. We heard where more understanding and partnership is needed, where there has been hurt, and where hope is growing. A common theme for building better understanding is around developing more information and understanding for the call process. Another was the call for giving mutual effort from among the clergy, provincial acolytes, and educators to lead and to be encouraging role models to congregations (and the province as whole) toward a deeper experience of trust for working together.

A big struggle in recent years has been an increasing inability to see beyond the perspectives and groups to which we are most accustomed. The kind of blurred vision that comes from the hardening of opinions and the deepening of prejudices and biases. How can we learn better ways to see and listen to one another? To see what is really there - what our neighbor sees, but what we often miss. To help others see what we see. To open our eyes together and see what we collectively have never seen or had the ability to see together. These are things the PEC, Commission for Congregational Development, and Commission on Ministry are teaming up to address in order to establish a stronger environment for growth and nurture for our congregations, ministry areas, and leaders.

As the Lenten season grows closer to Holy Week, I am reminded of the meaningful use of the expression in the Gospels for “seeing” especially in John’s Gospel, where the meaning is nearly always about seeing from the heart. Jesus said a lot about seeing. He warned his disciples about having eyes but being unable to perceive the things God desires. Warning them about their hesitance to embrace a new way of seeing the life and the world through the lens of the “Kingdom of God” rather than the world’s way of power and control over others. Jesus consistently modeled for them a new way of seeing anchored in unconditional love and grace, aimed at repairing the brokenness in the world.

I sense God is continuing to call all of us to work on this together. God most often chooses to reveal the things of God through the work of Christian community working together and not in isolation. A community choosing to anchor itself in unconditional love and aimed at the purpose of repairing divisions and brokenness.

The leadership summit was a positive event that included lots of appreciation for gathering and listening to one another with the goal of building a shared vision to guide the province. There is more work to be done in this regard, but we have made a solid start. We learned a lot about how we see things, and one another, and steps we could take to risk doing it better and more faithfully. It was also an opportunity to be reminded that God enables us to see well, but it requires our mutual effort and responsibility to show up for one another to do the work of listening and seeing beyond our assumptions and preferences.

That the first step as Jesus modeled, is seeking to understand and check our assumptions, but also putting in the work and effort to be heard and seen in a manner that benefits everyone and not just our personal goals.

As we move closer toward this most holy time in the life of our congregations and the province, join me in prayer and reflection for seeking to see and listen to one another from the heart. Let us allow the example of Christ we hear in the story of Holy Week to be our guide for how we should value and love one another and the world in which we are called to embody unconditional love and grace.

News from the PEC

March 2023

The PEC met on Feb 9 and 25. The main focus during February was the facilitation of the Leadership Summit held at New Philadelphia Moravian Church on Feb 23 and 24. It included 65 participants, which was close to full participation from bishops, clergy, provincial acolytes, educators, and seminary students presently serving in the Southern Province, and those eligible for call. It was striking to have broad participation, which included a few folks who had not attended similar gatherings in more than a decade. The event served as a platform for sharing PEC perspectives in key areas, while gathering input through discussion groups from all who participated. The PEC, along with the Commission on Congregational Development, and the Commission on Ministry, will be using this information to refine and develop our respective ministry efforts. A primary focus for the remainder of this year will be listening and building stronger relationships with congregations and leaders throughout the province toward the goal of a clear vision for the direction of the province and our shared ministries.

Of particular note was information received to increase understanding and awareness for the call process, while also building a stronger relationship between the PEC and congregations. This includes finding ways to connect to congregations beyond crisis mediation, call process meetings, and quadrennial review meetings. The leadership summit also helped the PEC further identify an array of assumptions and opinions among leaders that serve as barriers to better understandings for how congregational leadership can work better together.

At the Feb 25 in-person PEC meeting, we worked to delegate work between the members of the PEC. Presently we are working on building teams to process the data generated from quadrennial reviews and congregational surveys used in the call process. Another step has been the new adoption of a weekly virtual check-in to stay abreast of how our work is developing and better manage the large plate of topics and tasks that are constantly developing.

The PEC has accepted the invitation of the Concerned Moravians to attend the event they are sponsoring later this month. We also worked together to issue a statement to congregations and leaders for the importance of living up to the standard of behavior and the practice of our faith outlined in the Moravian Covenant for Christian Living and the Ground of the Unity Statement.

The PEC continues to work actively on the call processes underway at Ardmore, Bethabara, Come and Worship, Grace, Kernersville, and Raleigh. Additional conversations have been underway in the last month to support Macedonia and the Rev. Zach Dease in a process of taking sabbatical time later this year, as well as with Leaksville and establishing a process for discerning next steps for congregational ministry. Attention has been given to guidance and support connection for current candidates for ordination.

The PEC approved recommendation from the Provincial Support Services Board for adjustment of provincial share for three congregations for 2023. Note that all congregations have completed their 2022 financial responsibilities for provincial share except for one. The PEC has partnered with the new property committee under the PSSB, and in partnership with the Moravian Ministries Foundation. This group presently includes Neil Routh, Robyn Glance, Bobbie and NT Russell (Christ Moravian), Randy Peddycord (Providence), and Ron Bell (Calvary) – with special consultation provided by Kirk Saunders (Home).

The PEC has also given support for the priorities for CCD and COM as they further develop and refine their work for this Synod period.

Technology Team Consults Available

Technology, from the first tools to massive computers to tiny mobile devices we carry in our pockets, makes an impact on our way of life. Anytime a new tool is introduced there is a learning curve.

In Spring of 2020, world-wide we experienced a huge learning curve in terms of the tools and technologies that were needed to be in community and share the Good News of Jesus Christ in the world. While we have gotten into a new rhythm in many ways there are still ways we can use technology more effectively.

At the Southern Province Synod in 2022, we mandated the creation of a technology team to support congregations in this ongoing work of selecting and using tools for the work of ministry. This team is now in place and ready to connect with congregations. The Resolution from Synod 2022 states that this team will help congregations with.

1. “Live Streaming Worship to include hardware solutions such as internet access, cameras, computers, monitors, switchers, connections, cables, and software solutions such as software, streaming services, websites.
2. Small Group Meetings to include hardware solutions such as computers, cameras, lighting, and software solutions such as Zoom Meeting and other available video conferencing solutions.
3. A panel or persons trained in the installation and maintenance of these solutions and training for the operators; “
