# Happiness

Consider the significance of happiness. Is it important in the atmosphere of a congregation or ministry setting? When you pause to reflect on the key features of belonging to a spiritual community, does happiness make

the list? The presence of happiness and joy is a feature that has often been noted by observers about Moravian communities and leaders dating back through our history. Why is this so?

Happiness is one of the things that stands across the many parts of the Moravian world. Moravians are a happy people. A core part of the ministry they share with one another and the communities where they exist is a deep sense of joy that is rooted in their spiritual understanding of the world.

Most recently, my travels took me to two different places. One was a memorial celebration for the life and ministry of The Rt. Rev. Hopeton Clennon (Bethlehem, PA) and the other was the consecration of The Rt. Rev. Obed Martinez Lima (Cuba). While one might think that these would be radically different occasions, they shared many features. At the heart of both was a deep, joyful appreciation for the presence of God in the life of the person the community gathered to celebrate. Both included heartfelt singing and laughter. Both included tears of joy. And both exuded a deep sense of God's presence moving through happiness to touch each person in the audience.

In *The Spirit of the Moravian Church* by The Rt. Rev. Clarence H. Shawe, 1957 edited and revised by The Rt. Rev. Edwin Kortz, 1979, happiness is noted as the second significant characteristic of the Moravian Church after simplicity. Perhaps you heard the story that John Wesley reported of his voyage from England to Georgia in 1735. It is not clear from Wesley's diary if the ship encountered three terrible storms, or the same storm three times. All aboard were terrified! A rogue wave snapped the mainsail, the passengers and crew thought the ship was sinking. Meanwhile, the Moravians sang hymns in a spirit of calm assurance. Not exactly happiness, but something rooted in the calm assurance of God's presence to give hope. Moravians are notably aglow with a hope clearly connected to the joy of salvation.

Shawe notes this was a significant difference between the Moravians and other Pietists in the mid to late 18<sup>th</sup> century. "The Pietist has sin in the foreground and looks at the wounds of Jesus; the Moravian has the wounds in the foreground and looks from them upon his sin." (page 9). Moravians are aware they are sinners, yet remain happy thanks to the forgiveness of Jesus.

"To the Moravians, Lent and Good Friday were not meant to be a sorrowful time; not a fast but a feast," or at any rate a festival season (11). Shawe continues: "Zinzendorf often declared it a mistake to turn the sufferings of Jesus into a tragedy... Certainly, our emotions should be stirred, but not so much for pity... but with a sense of gratitude... for the astonishing love of God." Shawe reminds us that during the heart of our renewal period (1740s - 1760s) "Passiontide was not a time of mourning but of rejoicing in a great salvation and of dedication to that Savior who has done so much for us."

The challenge today is not the lack of joy and happiness among Moravians. It can be readily found wherever we gather. But connecting to Christ in such a way for the joy of our salvation to flow into the places we serve one another and the communities around us. To reclaim what Zinzendorf meant when he wrote:

Lamb of God, you shall remain forever

Of our songs the only theme;

For your boundless love, your grace and favor,

We will praise your saving name;

That for our transgressions you were wounded

Shall by us in nobler strains be sounded,


When we, perfected in love,

Once shall join the church above.



# Weber Lecture: "Pastoral Theology in Healthcase Settings"



WHO: International author, scholar and educator The Rt. Rev. Dr. Emmanuel Y. Larty presents Moravian Theological Seminary's 2024 Weber Lecture, "Pastoral Theology in Health Care Settings." With recent data

showing a significant increase in mental health diagnoses in the United States, Dr. Larty's talk will include the importance of pastoral care provided in health care settings especially those for individuals being treated for mental health conditions.

A native of Ghana, Dr. Larty is the bishop of the Ghanaian North American Methodist Churches, comprised of 38 churches in the U.S. and Canada. He is professor of Pastoral Theology and Spiritual Care at the Candler School of Theology, Emory University, Atlanta. In addition to authoring numerous articles and several books, he is co-editor of the 2022 book Postcolonial Practices of Care: A Project of Togetherness during Covid-19 and Racial Violence. Dr. Larty's lecture is free and open to the public.

The Weber Lecture, established in 1950, is named in memory of the Rev. Christian Otto and Dorothy Pfohl Weber. The lectures are given by theological leaders on the practical aspects of Christian ministry: counseling, evangelism, administration, preaching, mission work.
